



Kaga no Kuni refers to one town and five cities spread out among the foothills of sacred Mt. Hakusan, southwest of Kanazawa City, the central metropolis of the Hokuriku region. Kutani ceramics and other traditional crafts, hot spring villages scattered throughout the region, and delicious food from the mountains and sea are just a few of the attractions you'll find in Kaga no Kuni, a land blessed by Mt. What's the Old Hokkoku Kaido Road?

Constructed during the Edo period (1603-1868), this road connected the post towns of Toriimoto in Shiga efecture and Oiwake in Nagano Prefecture. When heading to Kyoto along the Hokkoku Kaido Road, Ionoichi City's Honmachi district was the first post town after Kanazawa Castle, and many examples of historical


The Kita family is an old family that used to operate a sake brewing business. The main building was originally located in Kanazawa, but was moved to its current location during the Meiji period (1868-1912). The main front door and intricate latticework on the facade are typical of machiya (traditional townhouse) architecture.

for an invigorating trip through nature

This 33.3 km driving route takes you from the foot of Mt. Hakusan to the historic village of Shirakawa-go. The road winds through a natural forest at an elevation of 600 to 1,450 meters, with many spots to stop at along the way, including seven waterfalls and several observatories with views of Mt. Hakusan .

What's a Geopark?

A geopark is a type of natural park that includes elements of geological heritage from which we can learn about the Earth's history, including nature such as the inhabiting plants and animals, and other objects of archaeological and cultural value. The Hakusan Tedorigawa Geopark was registered as a Japanese Geopark in 2011 with the "Journey of Water" and the "Journey of Rock" in the Tedori River area as its themes. It was recognized as a UNESCO Global Geopark in 2023.

Tedori Canyon Road

This 19.6-km dedicated cycling road stretches from the former Kaga-ichinomiya Station along the Tedori River to the Sena Roadside Station. Built on the remnants of an abandoned railroad line, this road offers a pleasant cycling experience with views of the Tedori Gorge area and the countryside.

Tedori Gorge ○手取峡谷

Beautiful natural formations carved by the Tedori River

This gorge, with 20 to 30-meter-high cliffs spans about eight kilometers of the Tedori River's middle reaches. You can see a variety of landscapes that vary depending on the flow of the river and the types of rocks. Highlights include the area around Komon Bridge, where the river narrows, and Watagataki Waterfall, with its 32-meter drop.

Pray to the goddess of relationships experience nature

Experience the natural beauty of the head shrine of approximately 3,000 shrines that revere Mt. Hakusan as a sacred mountain. Shirayama Hime Jinja Shrine was first built about 2,100 years ago and by local lore is where the goddess of marriage and matchmaking resides. If you take the Omotesando entrance at the base, you can enjoy the sounds of trickling water while looking up at the centuries-old cedar trees.





Fraditional techniques fused with artistic sensibility

Founded in 1879, this Kutani studio has been around for six generations. Products featuring motifs associated with China's Ming dynasty (1368-1644) arranged in a modern style and painted in *gosu*, an indigo blue pigment, are popular. Workshop tours are held during the Kiln Festival that takes place every year during the Golden Week holiday (late April to early May).



Kaga gampi paper is a type of Japanese paper made from the fiber of the gampi plant, a wild shrub indigenous to Yamanaka and elsewhere in Kaga. The paper is thin 📱 but strong with a satin-like sheen. It used to be used for making gold and silver leaf.




